Message from the Director:

Greetings! Thank you for your support, for your service to Rotary and for attending the 2010 Rotary Institute for Zones 28 and 29!

The theme for this year's institute is "Picture the Future". Over the course of this institute we will gaze into the future of Rotary fellowship and service. For more than 100 years, this organization has been able to survive and, in fact, thrive! Our amazing ability to do that has been dependent on two things:

1. Preserving our core values of diversity, leadership, fellowship, service and integrity; and
2. Adapting to and embracing the changes of society and our world.

Last year's institute focused on the core values of our organization that must be preserved as we move forward. This year we focus on change and how we are adapting to meet those changes. Not only will we focus on the societal changes that we are experiencing, such as social media and the goals of the new generations but we will also vision about our future and the ways in which Rotary and The Rotary Foundation are changing to meet these challenges.

Along these same lines, you will note some changes which have been implemented at the zone level. For the first time we now provide a zone directory in CD form and through our zone website. Each of us will have the ability to go on-line and regularly update our personal contact information. A PDF and EXCEL format of the CD directory will also be provided by e-mail to those interested. format for several years!) In addition, your institute and the training associated with it now comes at you in a new format. As part of an effort to search for the best practices available, I have made these changes. In the process of making the program format change, we are trying hard to provide good content while also focusing more on the past officers of Rotary. The cost savings to all concerned are significant. As an example, the number of hotel nights for our group is down to only 500 room nights from a high of over 800 just 2 years ago. Meal cost savings are also significant, as those being trained are no longer paying for 5 or even 6 days of meals. It is hoped this shorter format will attract younger leaders to step up and serve, since the impact on time away from work is clearly less.

These changes will affect some old practices. The easiest path would have been to simply do what has always been done. However, the tougher choices often involve change and evolution can be difficult at first.

So in this city, the home of Kodak, join us as we try to take a snapshot of Rotary's tomorrow: Together Let's Picture the Future!

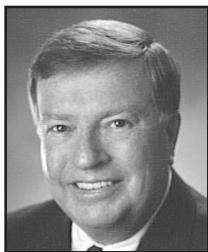

Judie and I are pleased to welcome you to the 2010 zone institute in your respective part of the Rotary world. We attended our first zone institute in Little Rock, Arkansas, USA in 1974 and we have now attended more than 50 institutes around the world. As a result, we are firm believers in the value of such meetings!

We have undertaken several improvements for the current Rotary year, and you probably will learn more about them at your respective institutes. I don't have space to give you the Top Ten achievements, but I will list the Top Five for you.

1) We have approved a revised strategic plan that is simpler to implement -- and easier to measure its progress, -- than the previous plan. One of the three priorities of the new 2010-13 plan is to help our clubs to become Bigger, Better, and Bolder.

2) We have realigned the RI committees to fit the revised strategic plan with a reduction in the number of committee members and meetings, which will save substantial expense for RI and permit the RI board to focus its attention on global issues.

3) We have recruited and trained 41 new Rotary Coordinators to provide more information for clubs and districts about RI programs and best practices in cooperation with the RRFCs. In short, their job is to help the district governors to help the clubs to be Bigger, Better, and Bolder.

4) We have developed a new method of assigning president's representatives to district conferences that gives an option to the district governors to select their own representatives a full year in advance.

5) And last, but not least, we are committed to finding new ways to attract younger club members, to enable younger Rotarians to serve as district governors, and to better utilize the talents and skills of past district governors, all of which will help our clubs to become Bigger, Better, and Bolder!

We have tried to create a culture of innovation for the current year, and our zone institutes are excellent meetings for discussion of the foregoing plans -- and for the development of still more ideas that deserve to be tried and tested. Zone institutes are ideal settings to send "Messages to the Board" through the Rotary network!

Ray Klinginsmith, a retired attorney from Kirksville, Missouri, USA, served as general counsel and professor of business administration for Truman State University (formerly Northeast Missouri State University) for more than 20 years. From 2001 to 2004, he served as a county commissioner for Adair County.

Ray has served as a director of the Macon-Atlanta State Bank in Macon, Missouri, since 1971, and he was one of the initial trustees for the Missouri Family Trust, which the Missouri legislature created in 1989. He was the president of Chariton Valley Association for Handicapped Citizens since its inception in 1982 until 2009, and is now president emeritus. He received the 1988 Parent/Caretaker Award from the Missouri Planning Council for Developmental Disabilities. He is a former member of the executive board for the Great Rivers Council of the Boy Scouts of America and the holder of its Silver Beaver Award for adult volunteers. He is a member of the First United Methodist Church in Kirksville and a former lay speaker for the church.

A member of the Rotary Club of Kirksville and a Rotarian since 1961, Ray has served Rotary as district governor, chair of the 1998 Council on Legislation in New Delhi, and chair of the 2008 Los Angeles Convention Committee. He was a member of the RI Board of Directors from 1985 to 1987 and chaired its executive committee in 1986-87. Ray joined The Rotary Foundation Trustees in 2002, serving as vice chair in 2005-06, and was a member of the Future Vision Committee from 2005 to 2008. Ray is a Major Donor and a recipient of the Foundations Citation for Meritorious Service and Distinguished Service Award.

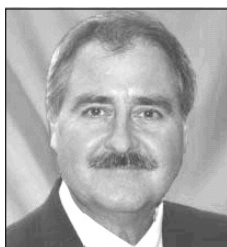

In 1996 Steve received The Rotary Foundation's Citation for Meritorious Service and in 2001 the Distinguished Service award. In 2002 he received Rotary International's Service Above Self Award.

Lisa Morris is originally from a small coal mining town in the North East of England and is affectionately known as a 'Geordie' – this she will explain in her talk! She moved to London for University where she remained taking time to travel the world and work in Uganda and Rwanda. In 2005 she was District 1090's Ambassadorial Scholar to South Africa (District 9320) where she completed a Post Grad Diploma in African Peacekeeping and Diplomacy and volunteered on the children's' ward at their local hospital.

Since her return in 2006, Lisa has been involved in 2 Matching Grants with 14 clubs from the District (George Dickenson Primary School and a Palliative care ward for children in Grahamstown South Africa) plus a Water Pump Project. Lisa will be updating us on these ventures. Over the last 3 years she has spoken to over 40 clubs (sometimes twice!), a school sixth form and was invited back to District 9320 to speak at their District Conference, where she had the great honour to receive a Paul Harris Sapphire from her host club in Grahamstown. She also went back to the World Cup, but this she won't be talking about!

Lisa currently works for her local Council in their Social Services Learning and Development department, looking after the council's academic programme.

One of her main hobbies is playing netball. And luckily for the Rotary Club of Elthorne Hillingdon her team was promoted recently, therefore changing the night she played and enabling her to join their club. It also aided the club to bring down their average age as she is only 34.



FAZAL RABANI

Rotary Scholar

Fazal was born in 1972 in a village called Ali Sheer in the Nangarhar Province of Afghanistan. At the age of six, his cousin encouraged him to get admission into school which was about four km away from home. There was no road so he walked to school. At the end of the school year, President Mohammad Daoud had been killed by Noor Mohammad Tarakee's organization. War started everywhere around Fazal's village which made it very difficult to live in the valley anymore so his family immigrated to Pakistan. They were living in an Afghan refugee camp and the Afghan Commissioner built a school. Fazal attended school there for eight years in the mornings and worked with a shopkeeper in the afternoon to help support his family. Fazal then attended high school in another refugee camp and graduated in 1990.

He decided to continue his education and studied English at Dawa and Jihad University and earned his bachelor's degree in 1994. Fazal was the only person in his tribe to earn a BA degree and his family was very proud. After earning his degree, Fazal worked as an English instructor at Nangarhar University in Afghanistan. He then applied for a permanent teaching position at the University. The rule for a permanent job as a professor at the university level at that time was to be under the age of 30 which Fazal was not and his application was rejected by the ministry of Higher Education. For those who have a master's degree, the age requirement is not considered.

While working as an English instructor at the University, Fazal heard about Rotarians who were involved in higher education and offering an opportunity to study in the United States for a master's degree. His name wasn't on the short list, but he was able to get an interview and was selected to receive an Ambassadorial Scholarship donated by Rotary District 6290 to study in Michigan. Fazal left behind his parents, six children and a wife, two brothers and three sisters and arrived in Grand Rapids, Michigan in August of 2009 to study in the TESOL (Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages) Program at Grand Valley State University. He will graduate with his master's degree in December of 2010. He is enjoying his educational experience, spending time with Rotarians, attending Rotary club meetings and events, the cultural and international experiences and being an Ambassador of goodwill.
